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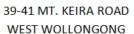

Martin Culleton discussed the importance of having wills and legal documents in place. He highlighted that police are focusing on seatbelt compliance, using cameras since the 1st of July this year. Martin said there is not much information for people who receive a seat belt infringement fine that have a vehicle manufactured with no seatbelts. Transport NSW and other sources could not assist him here. Members were advised to be aware of the legal requirements for seatbelts in historic vehicles, especially those manufactured before 1965. Members may need to provide evidence of their vehicle's age to avoid fines related to seatbelt compliance.
- •A Certificate of Appreciation was presented to a Peter Akhurst for 18 years of service as a Vehicle Inspector.

•Wayne Crouch asked if Bunnings Kembla Grange has been approached to advertise in The Klaxon. He was advised to see Peter Ellis.

Please note:

- 1) Members with vehicles on Conditional Registration NOT PARTICIPATING in the Log Book Scheme:
 - a) May use their vehicle within a 20kilometre radius of the vehicle's normal garage for the purpose of test drive and/or refuel ONLY, without obtaining SCVCC permission;
 - b) Wishing to use their vehicle in any event or function NOT PUT ON by the SCVCC MUST obtain SCVCC permission. Forms are available from the club's web site and must be authorized PRIOR to the event by the Plate Registrar or Assistant or President:
- 2) Members with vehicles on Conditional Registration PARTICIPATING in the Log Book Scheme MUST COMPLETE AN ENTRY IN THE LOG BOOK for any vehicle use which is not an organized club event. This includes completing an entry for:
 - a) Any test drives and / or refuels;
 - b) Participating in any event or function NOT PUT ON by the SCVCC or your nominated secondary club(s);
- 3) Members with vehicles on Conditional Registration participating in organized events put on by their secondary club(s) must notify the SCVCC Plate Registrar or Assistant to have their participation logged in an SCVCC Day Book;
- 4) The club has a common Conditional Registration expiry date of the 9th Dec. Vehicle inspection days are the last Saturday in Oct and the last Sunday in Nov each year;
- 5) You must be a financial member of the club for your Conditional Registration to be valid. This means paying your annual membership fees promptly due 1st July each year.
- 6) The club has a By-Law requiring any member with vehicle(s) on conditional registration to attend a minimum of 4 club events each year to maintain the registration(s). The committee may grant an exemption in extenuating circumstances;
- 7) When on an organized club event, you must enter your name and vehicle in the Events book. The Events Director or their nominee will have it at all Club events, SO PLEASE MAKE SURE YOU ENTER YOUR DETAILS ON THE DAY;
- 8) PETS ON CLUB EVENTS: If you take your pet(s) on any club events, to save any embarrassment and unpleasantness, please check with the venue or destination to make sure pets are allowed: (i.e. National Parks, motels, etc.).

What happened? An elderly woman went to the disabled toilet – had a bit of a turn, and could not get off the toilet to press the door release button.



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
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CONSTITUTIONAL REFORM PART 8 - OR "NEARLY AT THE END"

Saturday the 31st of August saw the closing date for member comment and input into the club'sproposed new constitution and by-laws.

We weren't knocked over by the last minute rush!

All up over the comment period, feedback was received from 7 members on just under a dozen issues. Fortunately, there was nothing particularly controversial or negative raised.

On this basis the committee have made some minor updates to the draft by-laws as follows:

- 1. The position of "Apparel Officer" has been added to Section 3 as an ordinary committee member along with this role's duties added to Appendix A;
- 2. The office bearers position of Vice President in Section 3 has been reduced from "more than one may be elected" to a singular position;
- 3. Some specifics on vehicles have been added to Section 5:
 - a. Identification checking on initial registrations;
 - b. Options for inspection of older (i.e. particularly vintage) vehicles;

Some comments were also received around wanting to include secret ballots for AGM elections and other significant resolutions in the by-laws. The committee agreed this is adequately covered in the Model Constitution Section 34 (3) (c) which states that items must be decided by a written ballot if the presiding member requires this or at least 5 members request this. Consequently, nothing was added to the by-laws on this issue.

Given the relatively minor changes, a hardcopy version of the updated draft by-laws will not be distributed to members. Instead, it is available for review & download from the club's website.

Look in the "Constitution Reform" section which can be found from the home page or via the link: https://www.southcoastvintagecarclub.org.au/constitution-reform/

If you have difficulty finding this or don't have access to the internet, then contact a committee member for a copy.

Note: All the changes that have been made from the previously issued version, and as described above, are shown in red in the updated version so that they may be easily found. A copy of the Model Constitution is also on the website, noting this is unchanged from the previously distributed version.

What steps remain & what's the timing to finalise the reform process?

It is planned to hold a vote at our Monthly General Meeting on 12th November about adopting both the Model Constitution and the updated By-Laws.

The specific resolution that will be put to members is:

"That from the 12th November 2024 the SCVCC adopts:

- 1. A new constitution consisting of the NSW Fair Trading Model Constitution as will be updated from time to time; and
- 2. A revised set of By-Laws as detailed in the document "SOUTH COAST VINTAGE CAR CLUB INC. BY-LAWS, Revision D dated September 2024."

The committee looks forward to your attendance at the November meeting and to a successful vote on adopting this resolution.

ANNUAL REGISTRATION INSPECTION DAYS

Our <u>First Inspection Day</u> will be in the carpark adjacent to South Coast 4WD Centre in Montague St North Wollongong, on Saturday 26th October. It will run from 9am till 12 noon.

The <u>Second Inspection Day</u> will be in the carpark at the front of O'Brien AutoGlass 109 Industrial Rd Oak Flats, on Sunday 24th November. Times are, again, 9am till 12 noon.

Some points to remember:

- To be eligible for registration with our club you must have attended at least 4 events during the year. Please bring your completed **Event Attendance** form along with you when you come to get your registration renewed. You also need to bring proof of the vehicle's comprehensive or TPPD insurance and your licence.
- Cars manufactured after 1980 are required to get a pink slip.
- Having a pink-slip inspection is an option for all vehicles regardless of age, and one that our hard-working inspection team encourage. If you do have a pink slip you don't need to attend an inspection day, just post a copy of the pink slip along with completed copies of the Event Attendance & SCVCC Club Declaration forms to Greg Wright at 38 Jarrah Cres Cordeaux Heights 2526 or email them to: registrations@southcoastvintagecarclub.org.au
 - Your **Historic Vehicle Declaration** (1259 form) will be posted back to you.
- As has been recent practice, inspections on the inspection days will be carried out at pre-booked times. To make a booking please phone Neil Beattie on 0417 792 057 or Greg Wright on 0439 400 674. (If there's no answer, leave a message and you will be called back). Alternatively email your preferred date & time to registrations@southcoastvintagecarclub.org.au and I'll get back to you.

THE HISTORY OF RON THORP'S BARGAIN BARN

(*Editor's Intro*). Some of our older members might remember Ron Thorp's Bargain Barn; a used car business on the highway in Figtree. It became synonymous for a place that sold "old clunkers". But to criticise the business on that basis was to miss the point. A recent article — written by Ron Thorp, and published in the Motorlife Museum's magazine — put the business in its proper perspective. Here is the story.

(This is the first part of a more complete article of his business).

With so much interest in preserving our motoring heritage, I thought your readers might be interested in how some vehicles have managed to survive with the supply of donor parts from vehicles which were not so fortunate.

I commenced my used car business in Wollongong in 1958, specialising in cheap transport for those people who could not afford to buy later-model vehicles. All the other used car businesses catered for the more well-off and were happy to sell me their cheaper trade-ins which were normally hidden at the rear of their premises.

My first boss, Austin Dwyer at Dwyer's Garage, where I served my apprenticeship, suggested that I should call my business Ron Thorp's Bargain Barn as he had seen similar businesses in the USA. He also rented me a vacant block of land at the corner of Auburn and Swan Streets in Coniston which appeared the Council Inspector who objected to me displaying the cars in the street.

The business grew exponentially from that point until a neighbouring business decided that they needed the property for expansion. Thus a search commenced for another site which materialised in the form of a vacant block on the Princes Hwy. at Figtree opposite the Gladstone Ave, intersection. I was fortunate to be able to purchase it with the help of my father who, by that time, had become somewhat more supportive of my emerging entrepreneurship.

The new location on the Princes Highway was a much better position with a steady stream of potential customers driving past each day, eagerly looking to see the latest bargains. By this time some of the original clients were on the lookout for a more suitable vehicle so trade-ins were replenishing the current stock.

In addition, we offered to finance their purchase with monthly repayments made at our premises which ensured regular visits, often resulting in another purchase when they spotted a "must-have" before they left the yard. The business continued to flourish with sales of around one hundred vehicles a month.

Some of the trade-ins were unsuitable for resale so a collection of these vehicles was moved to the back of the yard and became our first supply of used parts. In no time it became obvious that we would soon run out of room so the search was on for larger premises.

As luck would have it we became aware of an area of farmland which had been rezoned for a sawmill which did not go ahead. Its frontage to the Princes Hwy, at Yallah, was an ideal location, being on the southern side of Wollongong with no other development nearby.

VW GOLF TURNS 60

By the 1970s, VW's Beetle was beginning to look and feel a bit outdated: it had been in production since 1938, so no surprise that Volkswagen thought it time for an update. (But it would remain in production for another 30 years!).

Anyway, when they came to design the Beetle's replacement, they decided to follow the current automotive trend. And

the trend was towards front-engined front-wheel-drive hatchbacks. So that's the way they went. But not without some trepidation: this was the complete opposite of the rear-engined, rear drive Beetle. *It would be like driving one of those in reverse!* And even the engine itself was very different to the Beetle: instead of an air-cooled flat-opposed 4 cylinder, the new car was to have a water-cooled in-line 4.

Another huge difference was the shape of the car: instead of the rounded shape of the old car, the new one would be boxy with sharp edges. That, however, provided more room; with the new car being commendably spacious inside for both people and their luggage.

The design was done by Giorgio Giugiaro. It was released to the public in May 1974. Volkswagen were pleased with their new car; but they had to convince the buying public. This is what they wrote, in an effort to do just that. "The Golf offers maximum space and safety. It is uncompromisingly geared towards practicality. The low beltline gives a clear overview, and the sloping bonnet ensures the road right in front of the vehicle is visible." Sounds impressive! Others thought so too, with one article describing it as, "A symbol of modern automotive design, setting new standards in the compact car segment and establishing itself as a benchmark in the industry."

This is how Pedr Davis described it: "Fun to drive and highly roadworthy, Golf provides fairly refined transport, coupled with excellent fuel economy, brisk performance, and tenacious roadholding". No wonder it was so popular!

And popular it certainly was – allaying the company's fears that buyers would reject it for being so different to its predecessor. Instead, buyers were attracted to the modern design and practicalities of the new car. In October of 1976 the one-millionth Golf rolled off the production line. In total, up to the present day, 37 million Golfs have been built – 20 million of them in VW's main factory in Wolfsburg Germany, and the remaining 17 million in a variety of countries around the world, such as Belgium, Brazil, Mexico, South Africa, and more. To this day it remains Volkswagen's best selling car.

The original Golf was a three-door design, and was powered by a 1.1 litre engine. A 5-door version was soon introduced, and the engine upgraded to 1.6 litres. A convertible, and a sedan version (called the Jetta), soon followed. And then, of course, came the legendary GTI hot-hatch version.

The Golf was truly revolutionary; and it is a legend that still lives on!

HAPPY HALF CENTURY!

It's time to sing "Happy Birthday" to my Triumph 2500TC. And a very significant birthday it is too. As the title suggests, it turns 50 years old this month. The date of manufacture being October 1974.

As most people will know, my wife and I have owned this since new.

But it's not quite 50 years since we bought it. We bought it in April 1975. Car sales had slowed in the mid 1970s, and this car spent the first 6 months of its life sitting around the dealer's sales yard waiting to be bought. Perhaps one reason for that is that it is a manual. Despite its image as a sporting luxury sedan, automatics were more popular than manuals. But the 4-speed manual certainly had a performance advantage over the 3-speed auto.

The story of us owning it for 50 years should wait until April next year; so in this story I'll tell you a bit about the car.

Back in those days, Triumphs were assembled by AMI in Melbourne. As such, they used some Australian-sourced components, and they were also painted here – mostly using Toyota colours (AMI also assembled Toyotas). The colour of this car is a Toyota colour; "Bamboo". Some of those Australian-sourced components could end up being a bit unusual. For example, this was fitted with a Delco alternator. All other Triumphs had Lucas alternators, so how this got a Delco unit is anyone's guess. Another non-standard part was the accelerator cable. I found this out when it broke a few years ago. None of the three listed for that model fitted. Eventually one was found by the local Triumph specialist sending the broken cable to his supplier to match up.

If you know anything about British Leyland in the 1970s, you'll know that their build-quality wasn't great. And AMI wasn't much better. Consequently there were a few "teething problems" to be sorted out. One can still be seen in the photo – a missing clip on the bottom of the trim around the back window. The dealer did order one, but.... Well, they went out of business before it ever arrived!

Despite this somewhat inauspicious start, the car has lasted extremely well! I often say that it has aged a lot better than its owners! It is totally original. The engine, gearbox and diff are all unrestored original. The engine hasn't even had the cylinder-head off. Amazingly, even the clutch is original. Pretty good for over 230,000 km on a British car from the 1970s.

Likewise the body: there's no rust, and it's never had any body repairs. The only paint it's had (apart from at pre-delivery) has been for stone-ships, and a few spots under the rear lights that had a couple of surface-rust spots over the years. I sanded those, treated them with kill-rust and touched up the spots with a tiny brush. Having annual applications of fish-oil for the first few years has paid off. And the underside doesn't rust – "British rust-proofing" (oil leaks!) has seen to that.

Very early in its life it gained some improvements – window-tinting, dress-strip on the side, alloy wheels, and anti-sway bars. I think these things make it just a little more special. So, Happy Birthday Triumph! You're doing well for 50!
