

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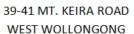

If you would like to put on an event for our Club, please contact the Events Director or an Events Committee member.

Please note:

- 1) Members with vehicles on Conditional Registration NOT PARTICIPATING in the Log Book Scheme:
 - a) May use their vehicle within a 20kilometre radius of the vehicle's normal garage for the purpose of test drive and/or refuel ONLY, without obtaining SCVCC permission;
 - b) Wishing to use their vehicle in any event or function NOT PUT ON by the SCVCC MUST obtain SCVCC permission. Forms are available from the club's web site and must be authorized PRIOR to the event by the Plate Registrar or Assistant or President:
- 2) Members with vehicles on Conditional Registration PARTICIPATING in the Log Book Scheme MUST COMPLETE AN ENTRY IN THE LOG BOOK for any vehicle use which is not an organized club event. This includes completing an entry for:
 - a) Any test drives and / or refuels;
 - b) Participating in any event or function NOT PUT ON by the SCVCC or your nominated secondary club(s);
- 3) Members with vehicles on Conditional Registration participating in organized events put on by their secondary club(s) must notify the SCVCC Plate Registrar or Assistant to have their participation logged in an SCVCC Day Book;
- 4) The club has a common Conditional Registration expiry date of the 9th Dec. Vehicle inspection days are the last Saturday in Oct and the last Sunday in Nov each year;
- 5) You must be a financial member of the club for your Conditional Registration to be valid. This means paying your annual membership fees promptly due 1st July each year.
- 6) The club has a By-Law requiring any member with vehicle(s) on conditional registration to attend a minimum of 4 club events each year to maintain the registration(s). The committee may grant an exemption in extenuating circumstances;
- 7) When on an organized club event, you must enter your name and vehicle in the Events book. The Events Director or their nominee will have it at all Club events, SO PLEASE MAKE SURE YOU ENTER YOUR DETAILS ON THE DAY;
- 8) PETS ON CLUB EVENTS: If you take your pet(s) on any club events, to save any embarrassment and unpleasantness, please check with the venue or destination to make sure pets are allowed: (i.e. National Parks, motels, etc.).

IMPORTANT FOR OUR FUTURE

With the push towards electric vehicles, questions are being asked as to what will happen to vehicles still using fossil fuels. This particularly applies to Historic vehicles, of course. The CHMC has issued a letter to all car clubs, providing a link to a survey that is being undertaken by the University of Canberra, in association with other organisations, to find out how this will affect all those involved in the historic vehicle scene. Here is how the letter begins:

"The CHMC is collaborating with the University of Canberra, Engineers Australia and Operating Heritage Australia to gather data on oil-based fuel and lubricant consumption in Australia's historic vehicle, tractor and antique machinery communities. The goal is to have an informed analysis of fossil fuel usage in these sectors, along with that from the heritage steam, rail, aviation and maritime heritage groups, who are also participating.

"A survey has been launched, 'Fossil Fuels in Heritage,' aimed at collecting details on fuel types, quantities, and owners/operators views on how they would transition to possible reduction in or phasing out of fossil fuels."

No doubt you will hear more on this, but I'll put the link <u>here</u>. (Sorry for those reading the printed copy - but the link is way too long for you to copy out by hand).

In any case, can I urge everyone to complete this survey. Any reduction in, or elimination of, fossil fuels would absolutely cripple our classic and vintage vehicle scene!



GETTING READY FOR THE RUN TO JAMBEROO IN A MISBEHAVING MG

For various reasons my stable of two vintage cars have spent much time in the shed over the last 18 months. The Wolseley seems to be ok with this, but the MGB went all sulky (sulky, definition; a light one horse 4 wheeled vehicle with roof optional). Anyway, the MG seems to have only one horsepower and would be difficult to start in the morning (like someone else I know), and backfires while demanding constant fiddling with the choke.

A nice run to Jamberoo is what the doctor ordered! Just to be sure I put on the battery charger the previous Sunday, to be ready for the big day out. For the uninitiated, the MGB originally had two little 6 volt horrors under what Hobbits call the back seat; this is for 50/50 weight distribution front and rear, but mainly to irritate the owner. I have a charging point just under the dash and thanks to Ross at Key Batteries (well-known vintage enthusiast!), I swapped these over for some much more powerful 12 volt jobs some years ago, and thereby hangs a tale.

Anyway, come Monday, the engine cranked over in a slow and grumpy sort of way. When I checked the batteries by pulling out the rear seat, I found acid build up on the terminals and a date stamp of 2014: the batteries were 10 years old. How time flies, if not the car. It seemed like yesterday I had them installed. Two things happen when you get old, your memory goes and.... umm something else.

To get the batteries changed at, by now, 4.00 pm, I would need to drive up to Key Batteries; but how to start the car? Of course, a can of "Start Ya Bastard" might do the trick, so I pulled off the ramflow air cleaner on the carby to find no sponge rubber filter. Oops, did it fall out on another previous occasion? The engine had been running lean for ages.

It turned out that I had used the wrong oil when servicing it and the filter had slowly disintegrated and had been... wait for it.... sucked into the engine. With the help of a really big battery and jumper leads, the engine reluctantly started and blew smelly burnt rubber smoke everywhere. These B Series engines are sturdy old sloggers, thank goodness!

Once I arrived at Key Batteries, Ross installed some even more powerful replacement batteries. Engine started like a modern fuel injected unit, or better!

Around to Repco next day for sponge rubber filter foam as seen on website; no luck. Back to Wollongong Auto Parts, where Chris, one of the owners, literally took one step back and pulled the necessary off a nearby shelf. "Got another one?" I asked, to be sure to be sure.

Then around to the motorbike shop to get the correct oil in a spray can. Back home to trim the foam, spray it and install. Hey Presto, a happy car! Moral of the story so far: try to remember when you put in your battery, if your car is slowly getting grumpy, give it some attention.

135 YEARS OF CASTROL OIL

"Oils ain't oils, Sol!" Remember the ad? The gangster telling his underlings what oil to use in his car. Well, I've been using Castrol forever. Something I inherited from my father, who was also a Castrol man. And one of the reasons he liked Castrol was that the company only made oil; they weren't a petrol company that made oils as a sort of by-product of their fuel. And they have a long history of making it. In fact, this year the company notches up its 135th anniversary. So let's look at the history of how it all began.



On the 19th March, 1889, Charles Wakefield resigned from the Vacuum Oil Company and set up the Wakefield Oil Company. The oils they produced were for heavy machinery – trains and industrial machines. But he soon developed an interest in the automotive scene.

He identified an important requirement for oil to work effectively in cars: it needed to be thin enough to circulate around the

engine when cold, but thick enough to work effectively at higher temperatures and higher revs. His researchers (some of his colleagues at Vacuum Oils had also left and joined him in his new venture) discovered that by adding a particular amount of castor oil (from the castor bean plant) it provided the qualities he was looking for.

The newly developed oil provided superior lubricating properties compared to traditional petroleum-based oils. The name "Castrol" was of course inspired by, and derived from, the "castor oil" used in the product. The cleverly engineered formula set it apart from its competitors and was a significant step forward in the development of automotive lubricants, offering enhanced protection and performance for engines.

Having developed this fancy new oil, Wakefield set about advertising it; or just making people aware of it. Wakefield had an interest in motor sport, so began sponsoring events and competitors. The Castrol name was advertised on banners and flags at car and motorbike races, and speed record attempts. A mobile competitions department, pictured above, provided support to these competitors. When a Castrol sponsored racer or record breaker won, Castrol would advertise the win by announcing that the winner had "done it with Castrol". During the 1920s and 30s, the land speed record was broken 23 times – and of those achievements, 18 were with engines running Castrol oil.

During this time, Castrol expanded its operations internationally; establishing a presence in key markets such as Europe, North America, Asia, and of course Australia. This global expansion was driven by the increasing demand for high-quality lubricants in the growing automotive industry. And the rest, as they say, is history. Now, if ever you're topping up the oil in a gangster's car, just remember, "Oils ain't oils!"

THE TWO-HORSE WONDER



This is another photo from our world-traveller, Glenn Lemcke. (Not quite "the world", but lots of it!). This was one he spotted in **Copenhagen**. It is, as most will recognise, a **Citroen 2CV**. Looking, as Glenn commented, probably better than the day it left the factory. It was immaculate.


The "CV" part of the name is an abbreviation of the French word, "cheveaux"; which means "horse". So, literally, it means "2 Horse". That indicates its taxable horsepower figure. The actual bhp when it was first produced was 9 bhp, from an engine of 375cc. Later versions kept increasing in capacity, with the final version being a 600cc.

When it was first produced, in 1948, it looked like it'd been made out of scrap metal. And canvas. It was utilitarian in the extreme. Citroen said it had been designed to, "Cross a freshly ploughed field with a basket full of eggs on the passenger's seat, without breaking them". This was because there were many unsealed roads in France at the time, so a suspension that provided a soft ride was an advantage. The 2CV had long-travel suspension that was connected front to back to aid stability. (Or as a farm car to collect eggs! ©).

It was produced from 1948 up to 1990; with 3.8 million being built.


