

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SHARE A RECIPE

To celebrate the beginning of Spring, this month's recipe is Spring Lamb Salad.

Ingredients

- 2 lemons
- I bunch mint
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 tbs extra virgin olive oil
- 1.50kg half leg of lamb
- 750g baby potatoes
- 500g Organic brown rice.
- 60g baby spinach leaves
- 500g frozen peas, blanched
- 2 zucchini, halved, thinly sliced



Method

Preheat oven to 220°C/200°C fan-forced. Zest and juice one lemon. Finely chop half of the mint. Combine zest and juice of lemon, garlic, finely chopped mint and half of the oil in a small bowl. Using a sharp knife, pierce lamb all over. Add lamb to a large deep roasting pan. Rub the oil mixture over lamb, pressing into cuts. Season well and cook for I hour.

Add potatoes to pan. Drizzle with remaining oil and season well. Cook for a further 30 minutes or until lamb is cooked to your liking and potatoes are golden. Remove pan from oven, cover lamb loosely with foil and allow to rest for 15 minutes. Slice meat from lamb.

Cut remaining lemon into wedges. Heat rice according to packet directions. Allow to cool slightly, then toss with spinach, peas, zucchini, potatoes and lamb. Serve topped with remaining mint leaves and lemon wedges.

Martin Brewer









JACK BRABHAM

Sir John Arthur (Jack) Brabham was born on April 2, 1926 in Hurstville, NSW and died on May 19, 2014 in Gold Coast, Queensland. He was the Formula One World Champion in 1959, 1960 and 1966. Brabham was involved with cars and mechanics from an early age. At the age of 12, he learned to drive the family car and the trucks of his father's grocery business. At 15, he left school, combining a job at a local garage with an evening course in mechanical engineering. Brabham then branched out into his own business selling motorbikes, which he bought and repaired for sale, using his parents' back veranda as his workshop. When he reached 18, he enlisted in the Royal Australian Air Force as a flight mechanic. At 20, he started a small service, repair, and machining business in a workshop behind his grandfather's



Brabham got interested in racing and began with "speed cars" which used dirt tracks. He won the Australian speed car championships in 1948, 49 and 50. By the mid-1950's, Brabham had moved to the UK where he began Formula one racwith ing the Cooper team. In 1959, he was one of 4 drivers competing for the Formula One

house. In



Championship at the Sebring GP in USA. On the last lap, he ran out of fuel and famously pushed his car over the finish line to win the championship. In 1962, Brabham left the Cooper Team and began his own racing team called The Brabham Racing Organisation. Brabham turned 40-year-old in 1996 and became annoyed by press stories about his age. In a highly uncharacteristic stunt at the Dutch Grand Prix, he hobbled to his car on the starting grid before the race wearing a long



false beard and leaning on a cane. He went on to win the race. Brabham confirmed his third championship at the Italian Grand Prix and became the only driver to win the Formula One World Championship in a car that carried his own name. Brabham retired

from motor sport in 1970 and returned to Australia. In retirement, he continued to be involved in motorsport, appearing at contemporary and historic motorsport events around the world. He often drove his former Cooper and Brabham cars until the early 2000s. In 1999, after competing at the Goodwood Revival at the age of 73 he commented that driving stopped him getting old. Despite a serious accident at the 2000 Revival, the first racing accident to put him in hospital overnight, he continued to drive until 2004. By the late 2000s however, ill-health was preventing him from driving in competition. Brabham made his last public appearance in early May 2014 with one of the cars he built. He died at his home on 19 May 2014, aged 88, following a lengthy battle with liver disease. He was eating breakfast with his wife, Margaret, when he died. In a statement on the family's website, Brabham's son David confirmed his father's death. Brabham was the last surviving world champion from the 1950s era.

Dear Son, Just a few lines to let you know I'm still alive. I'm writing this letter slowly because I know you can't read fast. We are all doing very well. You won't recognise the house when you get home - we have moved. Your dad read in the newspaper that most accidents happen within 20 miles from your home, that's why we moved.

I won't be able to send you the address because the last Irish family that lived here took the house numbers when they moved so that they wouldn't have to change their address.

This place is really nice. It even has a washing machine. I'm not sure it works so well though: last week I put a load in and pulled the chain and haven't seen them since.

Your father's got a really good job now. He's got 500 men under him. He's cutting the grass at the cemetery.

Your sister Mary had a baby this morning but I haven't found out if it's a boy or a girl, so I don't know whether you are an auntie or an uncle.

Your brother Tom is still in the army. He's only been there a short while and they've already made him a court martial.

Your Uncle Patrick drowned last week in a vat of whiskey in the Dublin Brewery. Some of his workmates tried to save him but he fought them off bravely. They cremated him and it took three days to put out the fire.

I'm sorry to say that your cousin Seamus was arrested while riding his bicycle last week. They are charging him with dope peddling.

I went to the doctor on Thursday and your father went with me. The doctor put a small tube in my mouth and told me not to talk for ten minutes. Your father offered to buy it from him.

The weather isn't bad here. It only rained twice this week, first for three days and then for four days. Monday was so windy, one of the chickens laid the same egg four times.

About that coat you wanted me to send you, your Uncle Stanley said it would be too heavy to send in the mail with the buttons on, so we cut them off and put them in the pockets.

John locked his keys in the car yesterday. We were really worried because it took him two hours to get me and your father out. There isn't much more news at this time. Nothing much has happened.

What on earth is Sabrage ???



It's a technique for opening champagne bottles with a sabre, usually for ceremonial occasions. The wielder slides the sabre along the body seam of the bottle to the lip to break the top of the neck away, leaving the neck of the bottle open and ready to pour. The force of the blade hitting the lip breaks the glass to separate the collar from the neck of the bottle. The technique became popular in France when the army of Napoleon visited many of the aristocratic domains. The sabre was the weapon of choice for Napoleon's light

cavalry. Napoleon's spectacular victories across all Europe gave them plenty of reason to celebrate. During these parties, the cavalry would open the champagne with their sabres. There are many stories about this tradition. One is that of Madame Clicquot, who had inherited her husband's champagne house at the age of 27. She used to entertain Napoleon's officers in her vineyard, and as they rode off in the early morning with their complimentary bottle of champagne, they would open it with their sabre to impress the rich young widow.

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








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
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
